With just over a week now until Holy Week the children have been preparing for the Celebration of Easter with a range of Lenten activities on the theme of giving, acting and praying during Lent to express our belonging to God.

grounds. As we walked, we thought about and prayed for our global neighbours who aren't as fortunate as ourselves. The children did so well and enjoyed the walk with staff members.

On Tuesday Fr Adrian will welcome everyone to St Joseph's Church to celebrate the Feast of St Joseph's. The whole school

will be in attendance and all families are welcome to join children and parishioners for mass starting at 10:00am.



We have lots of Easter activities to look forward to which I have included in the diary section of the newsletter. Some key dates include our annual Lenten Stations of the Cross at St Anne's Church at 10:00am & Penny Challenge at 1:00pm on Wednesday 27th March. Parents are invited to both events and the school gate will open at 1:00pm for the Penny Challenge on the top yard. Our KS2 Easter Egg Competition and Rec & KS1 Easter Bonnet Parade will take place on the last day of term with parents or children being able to drop Eggs off in the Hall from 8:30am.

I was delighted to welcome Northumbria Police to school on Wednesday to discuss with KS2 classes online safety, bullying and potential consequences of misusing social media. We will be following this up in school soon which will include a parental workshop that parents will find very interesting, we will let you know when dates are confirmed.

Can I say a huge well done to all the staff and pupils that ventured to London this week to visit parliament. The school's council led by Mrs Douglas, Miss Cohen, Mrs Chalmers, Mrs Morgan and Mrs Lewis had a

wonderful day which started not long after 4:00am. They also managed to squeeze in Buckingham Palace, The London eye, Downing Street and the Embankment. The children visited both the Houses of Parliament and Houses of Lords which included a debating workshop.

Monica was a wonderful long serving parishioner, teacher and then deputy head teacher at St Joseph's and lived a very busy life with many of our parents and grandparents being taught by Monica. 

Year 3



Gospel

Sunday 17th March 2024 - Exaltation through suffering

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. These approached Philip, who came from Bethsaida in Galilee, and put this request to him, 'Sir, we should like to see Jesus.' Philip went to tell Andrew, and Andrew and Philip together went to tell Jesus. Jesus replied to them: 'Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. I tell you, most solemnly, unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a single grain; but if it dies, it yields a rich harvest. Anyone who loves his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in this world will keep it for the eternal life. If a man serves me, he must follow me; wherever I am, my servant will be there too. If anyone serves me, my Father will honour him. Now my soul is troubled. What shall I say: Father, save me from this hour? But it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name!' A voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it



again.' People standing by, who heard this, said it was a clap of thunder; others said, 'It was an angel speaking to him.' Jesus answered, 'It was not for my sake that this voice came, but for yours. Now sentence is being passed on this world; now the prince of this world is to be overthrown. And when I am lifted up from the earth, I shall draw all men to myself.' By these words he indicated the kind of death he would die.
